Parental Controls

Does your child have a games console? If yes, have you set up ageappropriate parental controls? The controls vary across the different consoles, but all will allow you to restrict spending and communication for example.

PlayStation

Does your child watch livestreams?

What is livestreaming?

Livestreaming is when an individual broadcasts video live over the internet. People can watch livestreams from any device that is connected to the internet.

Who is watching livestreaming?

Research from Ofcom reported that 57% of 3 – 17 year olds have watched live streams and the most used platforms to watch live streams were YouTube and TikTok. The research also showed that the



percentage watching content on livestreaming app/sites increased by age. A third of 3-4 year olds were watching live content with this number growing to eight in ten of 16-17 year olds. This is reported in <u>Children and</u> parents: media use and attitudes report 2022 (ofcom.org.uk).

What are the risks?

There are risks associated with watching livestreams that you should be aware of. The main risk being that your child may see or hear something inappropriate as your child may come across themes or content that is not suitable for them. It is difficult to moderate live content as it is happening in real time.

How can I help my child?

All online platforms have an age rating, ensure your child only
accesses platforms that are appropriate to their age. For example, TikTok
has an age rating of 13.

 For any platforms that your child uses, ensure appropriate parental controls and privacy settings are applied.

 Take an interest in what your child is doing online and on a regular basis, ask your child to show you what they are accessing.

 Ensure your child knows how to use any reporting/blocking tools on the app that they are using and as always please ensure that your child knows to talk to a trusted adult if they see anything that concerns them online.

Playing games online

Does your child play games online? We have outlined some points that you may wish to consider to try and create a safer experience for your child.

Have you set up parental controls?

As well as setting up appropriate parental controls through the



game's setting, ensure you have set them up on the console/device your child is playing on. For example, many consoles allow you to restrict the games accessed by age.

Chatting to strangers

Some games will allow communication, for example (FIFA and Fortnite). Depending on the game, this may be via the in-game text chat, direct messages or talking through headphones. Some games do offer the ability to switch communication off or restrict bad language so make sure settings appropriate to your child are set up for each of the games they play.

It can be difficult to moderate online chat so ensure your child knows how to block and report other players who make them feel uncomfortable and that they know to talk to you or a trusted adult if they have any concerns. It can also be very easy online for children to behave in a way that they would not if they were face to face with each other. Talk to your child about how they are speaking to others online and encourage them to talk to people online with respect, like they would if they were face-to-face.

Is the game age appropriate?

Before buying the game, check that your child is old enough to play it. All games will either have a PEGI rating or be rated by the App Store /Google Play. UK Safer Internet Centre have published a blog, which shares tips on what to do if your child asks about playing a new game:

In app purchases

In addition to the above, you should be aware of in app purchases as lots of games include the option to purchase additional items/subscriptions so ensure you do not have payment cards saved or set up restrictions/pin code to approve.

Scary Teacher 3D

Scary Teacher 3D is a game rated as 12+ by the App store (due to Mild Realistic Violence) or as 'Teen' on Google Play (due to violence). The game does include in-app purchases as well. Players must scare their teacher by completing different activities. There are lots of videos of this game on YouTube as well.

As with all games your child is asking to play, please take note of the age rating and play the game first to see if you think it is appropriate for your child.

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is week in Turtles Class...


In Turtles this week our topic for Autumn is Journeys. Our focus text for two weeks is the 'The Naughty Bus'. We have been looking at different types of transport and discussing our own Journeys. Miss Fowler, Mrs Evans and Miss Price are super proud of how well the children have settled into Turtles Class! We have practised our cutting skills and have made our own buses.




In Literacy we have sequencing the story of 'The Naughty Bus'. We have been playing in our Naughty Bus Tuff Tray and using new vocabulary to discuss photos of different buses.

In phonics we follow the RWI Scheme. We have been busy revising

and learning our set I sounds.




In maths we are looking at matching and sorting objects into different groups. We have also been discussing biggest and smallest and comparing different objects.



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This week in Starfish..



We have been reading the book 'The naughty bus'. This is because our topic this term is Journeys. In this story, a cheeky London bus makes a mess on his journey. We have been focusing on reading key words from this story. This is relating to our phonics where we have been learning to segment the sounds in our words and blend them together. For example: b-u-s makes bus.

In maths, we have been learning about numbers to IO. We have been counting and working on recognising the numerals. We have been ordering numbers to IO.

In science, we have been learning about seasons. We carried out an investigation to find which temperature water would melt ice the fastest. We found that warm water melts ice the fastest.



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Literacy

Week In


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Over the last few weeks the children have been learning about the story book Tidy. They have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know the story and are loving our word aware word scrappy from the story. Following on from the immersion activities, the children have began to rewrite the story and will be changing the stories main character and rewriting the story to understand how we can use stories to support our own writing and retelling.

Maths:

In maths, we have been exploring place value up to 100. The children have been learning about the values of tens and ones and have learnt how to count in 10s. The children have learnt to write numbers in expanded form numerically and in words.







Geography

In Geography, the children have been learning about the local area. Pupils have learnt that Teagues Bridge Primary School is in Trench and Trench is in Telford. The children then learnt how everyone's address has the same information but the street numbers, names and postcodes change depending on where they live.



This week in Dolphin Class...

This week Dolphin's enjoyed working with Mr Smith from Amazing ICT. We used a search engine called Swiggle to research information about India. There are lakes in India, so we found pictures of Indian boats and we also searched for animals that live in India. We used Swiggle as it is a safer search engine than Google or Bing. 


In science we have started our topic of 'Everyday Materials'. We began by looking at the properties of materials. We enjoyed taking part in a feely bag competition where we had to describe a material by it's properties for others to guess what it was.



In geography this week, we used Google Earth, maps and atlases to begin to look at our local area, finding the school and other interesting features of the local area.

> In maths we have been learning about the place value of 2 digit numbers and have been using the Base IO manipulatives to identify the value of each digit.




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Star Player of the week award



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In the news this week

The 2024 edition of the Guinness World Records has been released. This year, over 30,000 applicants submitted their achievements, but only 2,638 records were selected for the edition, which features more than 80% new and updated records. The annual collection of records has run since 1955, when it was first inspired by the question 'What's the fastest game bird in Europe?'. Its latest edition is themed around the Blue Planet, with a number of records celebrated, including those set by impressive marine creatures, adventurous sailors and recordbreaking lakes, rivers and icescapes.
