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Safeguarding Information for Parents

What is Child Soual Explication (CSE)?

Child sexual exploitation (CSE) is a form of child sexual abuse. Child sexual exploitation is a term used to describe where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child under the age of 18 into sexual activity. The child may have been sexually exploited even where the sexual activity appears consensual. For instance, the child might have been led to believe they are in a consensual relationship with the person.

Child sexual exploitation does not always involve physical contact; it can also occur through the use of technology, such as social media and gaming apps.

What are the signs that a child may be being abused or exploited?

Understandably children can find it very difficult to talk to adults about the harm they are experiencing and may not even recognise that what's happening to them is abuse or exploitation. They may not always show any outward physical signs of abuse, but there are some things to look out for, including emotional or behavioural signs. Some things you may notice in your child are outlined below. This is not an exhaustive list of the signs of abuse and exploitation and they can also be indicators of other difficulties a child is facing, not just sexual exploitation.

- physical signs, such as unexplained injuries, regular infections
- changes in emotion
- issues with their mental health, emotional wellbeing or self-esteem.
- changes in behaviour
- changes in their usual habits such as eating, use of phones or changes in friendships
- having more sexual knowledge or displaying more sexualised behaviour than is developmentally appropriate for their age
- having things such as money, phones, opensive clothes or other items, when you don't know how they have bought them.
- being away from home or school where you don't know where they are


| What do I do if I have concerns?

If you are worried that a child may be being sexually abused it is important that you share that concern, the information you have may help professionals to build a picture about what might be happening to a child and help them. 








In maths we have thoroughly enjoyed looking at one more and one less and exploring numerals 8 and 9.










This week in Starfish..

In maths, we have been learning about shapes. This is both 2d and 3d shapes. We have been naming them and looking at the properties.
















In geography, we have been learning about the countries that make up the UK. We have been learning their names and where they are positioned on a map.

Literacy

This week in Literacy, children finished their discussion texts on fireworks. The children have absolutely loved this genre and have really got enthused about the topic.

The candles represent hope, peace, love and joy.


This week in Dolphin Glass...






Star Player of the week award

In the news this week

Scientists monitoring a volcano in Iceland have said an eruption could happen. The Fagradalsfjall volcano previously erupted two years ago, in 2021 - the first time in over 800 years. It is now thought that the volcano is the cause of a series of earthquakes, which started this October. An underground river of magma led to the evacuation of 4,000 people from the town of Grindavik and Iceland has declared a state of emergency. People who live there have since been allowed to return just to collect belongings, with the likelihood of eruptions remaining high.
