







This week in Turtles Class....





In Literacy we have been writing some postcards from when we went on a journey and choosing characters from the story of 'Terrific Trains' to ask the character a question. about their journey.


In phonics we follow the RWI Scheme. We have been busy revising and learning our set I sounds and writing spellings.




In maths we have thoroughly enjoyed learning our ten town numbers to 10 and becoming confident with one more and one less.










This week in Starfish..



In literacy, we have been reading the book 'Emma Jane's aeroplane'. In this story, Emma Jane travels around the world. We have related this to geography and our local area of Trench. We wrote about Telford and talked about landmarks that we know. This is because Emma Jane see's landmarks in cities around the world.

In maths, we have been learning about measuring the length and height of objects. Firstly, we did this using cubes, then we began to use a ruler.

We really enjoyed the performance of Sleeping Beauty, oh no it's not.... Oh yes it is! We sang lots and danced lots with the pantomime group!

In phonics we have now learnt all of our set I and set 2 sounds. We are using these in our writing and spellings.



We also loved our visit from Battlefield Birds of Prey. We saw the birds fly through our classroom and talked about the journey's they make through the winter months.

Literacy

This week children have continued to complete work around the story Little Robin Red Vest. Children have really enjoyed the story with the Robin being kind and giving all his nice warm vests to the other animals who were cold. He was rewarded by being given his very own vest from Santa that keeps him warm all year! Children have wrote the story and have now changed the Robin in the story into a Tomte.

Maths:

In maths, we have been learning about money. We have learnt to calculate with money and have now learnt how to make a pound with money, understanding that IOOp is the same amount as £I. After we learnt about money we have moved on to problem solving before revisiting place value. In place value, pupils have began to understanding estimating numbers on a number line.




