






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This week in Swordfish class...



This week the children have started a new writing cycle and have been learning all about 'explanation texts'. We looked a range of examples focusing on the language used, the structure, and some of the key features. As part of the children's chance to shine, they will be explaining why rainforests are so important to humanity. As we have carried out lots of research, ask your child what they know about


rainforests and what the words below mean. The children created their own dictionaries and we discussed the definitions in detail before putting them into sentences.

In 'Word Aware' we have learnt the following words: canopy, evergreen, hibernate, extinct, deforestation



Maths





The children have been learning all about fractions this week and making links to decimals. This was a real challenge, so we decided to work together in small teams to solve a range of problems. Ask your child what the word 'equivalent' means – this is something we have been discussing a lot. To support our learning, we made use of the place value grids and the number lines.



Music

The children have really enjoyed their music lesson this week, as they got to learn some new songs and even had the chance to play the xylophones!









Within art, we have been learning about shape and pattern. The children learnt that a pattern is a repeated design. Using different 2d shapes the children created a pattern. After that, they used a repeated pattern to create their own piece of artwork inspired by our artist Henri Matisse's artwork 'The snail'.











Finally, the children followed a step-by-step video to draw an Ancient Egyptian scarab beetle. During the lesson, the children learnt how to sketch and that the scarab beetles represented life and growth for the Ancient Egyptians. In addition, we learnt that the red circle which the scarab beetles hold represent the world.





This week in Octopi...


Another fantastic couple of weeks here in Octopus Class...


We have had great fun during our science lessons, exploring light, how it can be measured and comparing objects that are translucent, transparent and opaque. During this week's science lessons we created our own circuits using crocodile clips, batteries and bulbs. We then used the iPad's to measure the brightness of the bulbs with a 'lux' app. We learnt that we measure brightness in lux and we were testing whether to see if when we increased the voltage of the batteries, the bulb would subsequently get

brighter. Prior to the test we made a hypothesis, predicting what we thought may happen during the tests and consequently the results that could appear. During the test, we recorded our results on a table and used this information to draw comparisons once the test had concluded. We then compared our conclusions with our hypothesis to see whether our predictions were correct.











During our computing lessons, we have been using Micro bits to continue to develop our understanding of coding. Mr Hale has been teaching us for our computing lessons and we have thoroughly enjoyed developing our skills, learning more advanced vocabulary and putting this into practice. 


Additionally, we have continued to build on our French skills over the past couple of weeks, becoming more confident in counting forward and backwards to 10. We have also had a go at writing some basic French calculations and this week we have moved onto colours. We played a simple game to test our understanding and recollection of colours by calling out the colour in French when shown a piece of coloured card and being asked the question `C'est de coluleur?'.




This week we have been working very hard completing our SATS papers for maths, reading, spelling and grammar. I would like to congratulate all of the Sharks in the way they have conducted themselves during the week and tried their absolute hardest in all the papers!

In art, we applied the knowledge and skills we had learnt in previous lessons on line and shape, to produce pencil sketches of the great pyramids of Giza, linked to our history topic. Here are some of our examples



In science, we have been investigating what is needed to form a shadow and what factors effect the length of a shadow. We started by looking at the distance of the light source from the object, before moving onto changing the angle that the light source hits the object. We then made the comparison between our findings and how the sun's position effects shadows made outside.
