home.










This week in Swordfish.....

English

The children have been introduced to their new text 'Mufaro's Beauti-ful Daughters'. We have discussed the characters in the book as well as discussing the important message. The children have also been practicing writing sentences with conjunctions and subordinate clauses.



Maths

This week we have been learning about perimeter. We have calculated the perimeter of rectilinear shapes as well as calculating missing lengths. Next week we will be moving on to calculating the perimeter of polygons.

Geography

In Geography, we have started our new topic, the UK. We have discussed whereabouts we live in the world, locating it on a globe and in an atlas. We will then be researching the four countries and identifying their human and physical features. I was very impressed with the student's research projects over the Christmas break!

'Take One Picture'

Last week, we focused on Monet's painting 'View of Argenteuil'. We researched the artist and discussed our responses to the image. We then practiced mixing colours and using different brush techniques to mimic Monet's style. At the end of the week, we created a multimedia final piece using paints, brown paper and pencil. Literacy


This week in Literacy we have started to look at the book Street Child by Berlie Doherty. To start this unit we have had a main focus on sentence structures, making sure we perfect our spelling, punctuation and grammar. We have looked at subordinating and coordinating conjunctions and how they differ. We have used these in sentences and experimented with moving the clauses around the


conjunction to created varied sentences. This has shown the children how to use a variety of sentence starters in their independent writing


In Maths we have been learning about rounding to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000 moving up to hundred thousands. The children have learnt to look at the number next to the indicated place value column and use that to determine if a number is rounded up or down. Next we will be moving on to addition and subtraction word problems. These often prove tricky for the children as they need to interpret what the question in asking them to do and then do extra steps on top. Extra information or help can be found here.

Science

In Science we have been looking at classifications of living things. Learning from Aristotle that all things can be organised and classified. We started by classifying foods, singers and footballers to engage in what classification means. We then transferred those skills onto animals and plants and were able to come up with our own categories and sub-categories to classify a variety of living things.









This week in Octopi...

A fantastic first couple of weeks here in Octopi class.

We thoroughly enjoyed immersing ourselves into our art themed week 'Take One Picture', whereby we focused on the painting 'Homeward Bound' by Ted Dyer. We began by exploring the painting, picking out the varying hues and shades as well as the techniques used by the artist. We then moved onto some colour work, whereby we compared primary and secondary colours and explored creating the range of hues identified within the painting through mixing various colours together. After that, we then moved onto sketching various elements of the painting. We focused on a magnified aspect of the painting and sketched out our own interpretations of the piece. Finally, we then took half of the painting and had a go at sketching the other half to recreate the whole painting. This week in Sharks

Last week, we started the spring term with our one week mini theme: 'Take one picture'. This was focused around the art work 'Hunters in the snow' by Pieter Bruegel the Elder. In literacy, we used what we had learnt about diary writing to write a 3 day diary from the perspective of one of the hunters. In art, we first learnt colour mixing using watercolours and also looked at perspective. We then used



these skills to draw and paint our own interpretations of the original art work. Here are some of our examples.











This week, in computing, we have looked at using databases to manage data. We looked at I criteria searches before moving onto 2 criteria searches using and / or. During programming with Mr Smith, we used our scratch knowledge of variables to programme our own rotating wind turbine. We then developed the program to rotate at different speeds and different directions. If you would like to see an example of our working turbines, scan the QR code on your smartphone.

Homework of the week award


