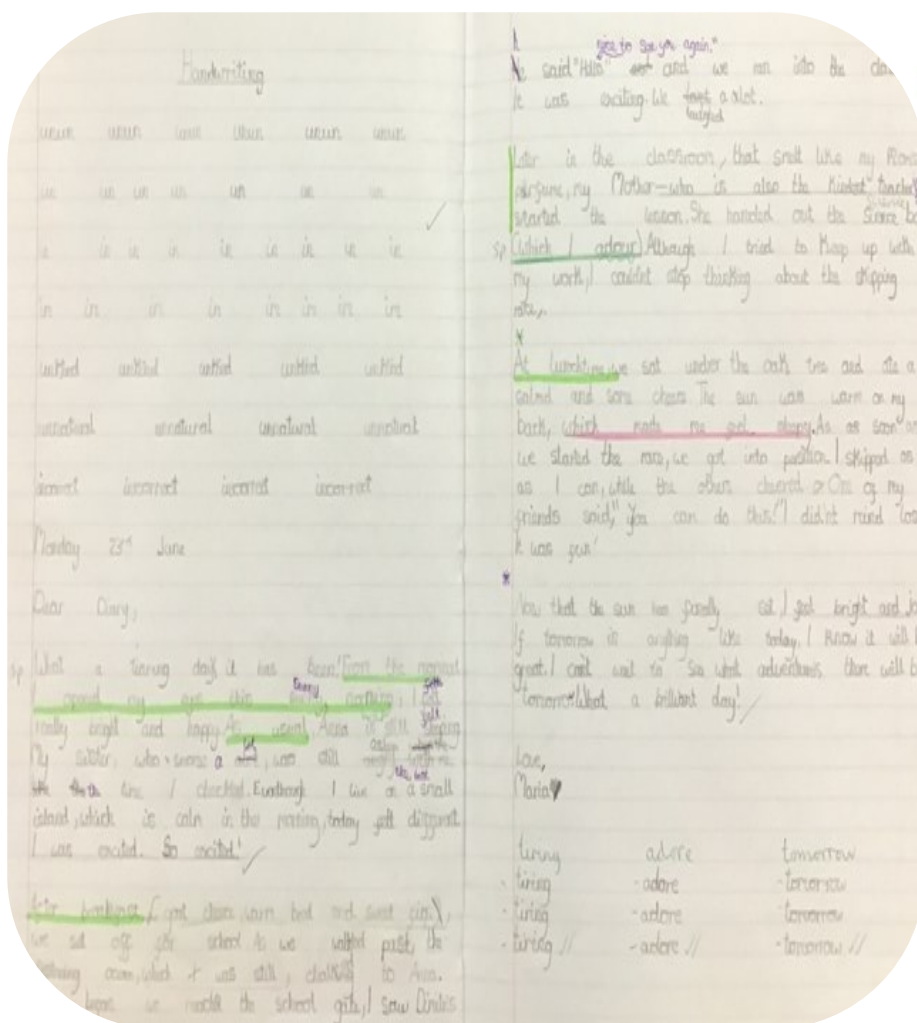

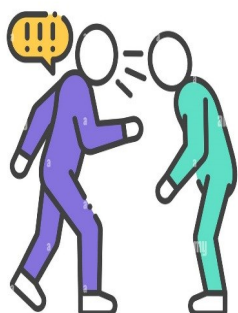
TRANSITION 1:

All children will be moving to their new bases on Monday the 7th July and Monday 14th July.

VERBAL ABUSE

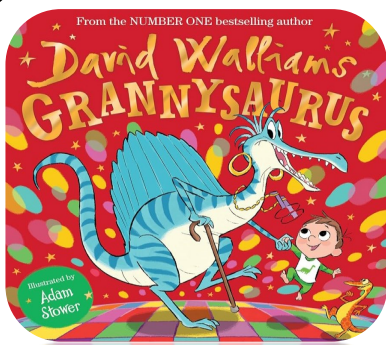

This week in Turtles Class.....

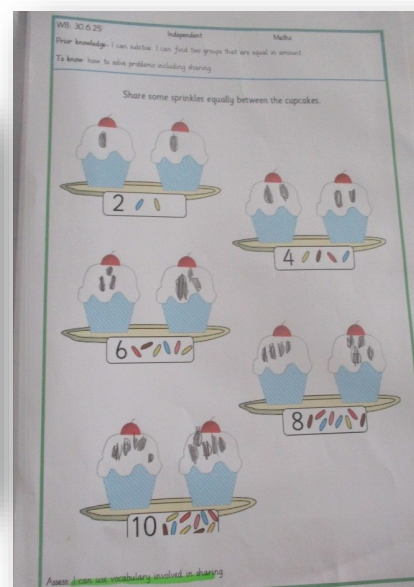
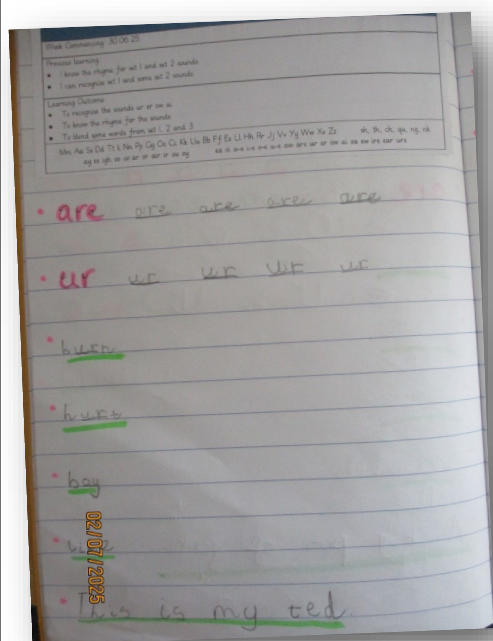


In Read Write Inc this week we have been learning our new sounds.

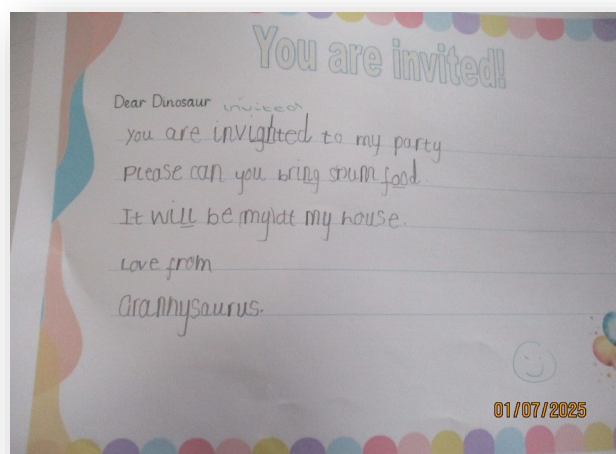


In base 1 we are enjoying our topic called 'All Creatures Great and Small'. We have enjoyed using the role play to recreate the story 'Grannysaurus'.

In maths we have been learning about numbers up to 20 and understanding doubling. and sharing.



In Literacy we have been learning about the story 'Grannysaurus' by David Walliams.. We have focused on writing party invitations and creating story maps.

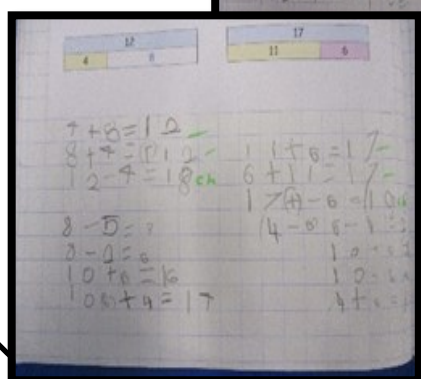
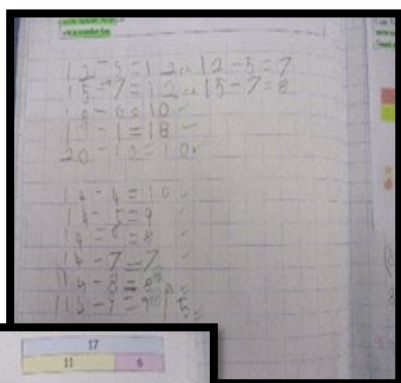


In Geography, we have been learning about the human and physical features in Telford. We sorted some of the areas we know around Telford into human or physical features such as Trench Pool and Jungleland.

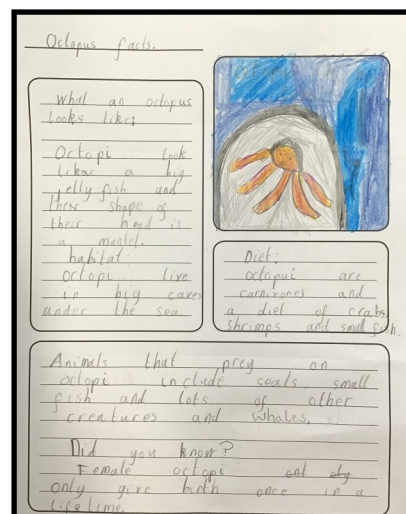
Literacy

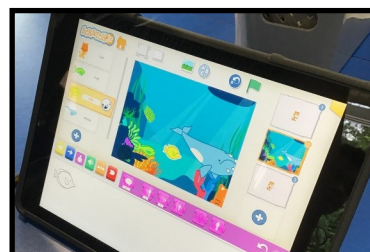
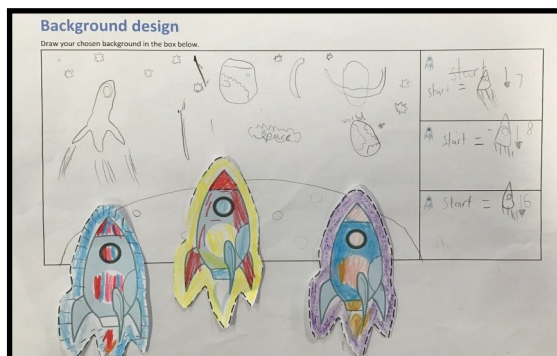
Science

This week in science, to build on our understanding of habitats and animal habits, the children researched animals and created their own non-chronological reports to share with the rest of the class.



Computing

In ICT, the children have been learning how to use the program Scratch Jr. and building up to create their own algorithms. Last week we learnt how to change the character (sprite) to match its background and this week we have designed



Eat Well

This week, children in key stage 2 took part in two workshops as part of the Eat Well project. The first workshop taught children about the Eat Well guide and how to make healthy food and drink choices. The second session was a Sugar Awareness session where children learnt to use the Food Scanner App to look at the amount of sugar in foods.





This week in Dolphins...

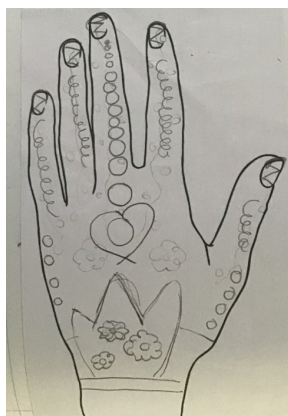
History

In History children compared Victorian toys to the modern toys we have today. Children learnt that they didn't have electronic toys or plastic toys, and that the materials used were mostly wood, metal and fabric. Children were surprised to learn that many of the toys we have today were around in the Victorian era but had some differences. Children made a list of the similarities and differences between a Spinning Top and a Doll, comparing the Victorian version to the modern versions we see today.

Similarities	Differences

RE



This week in RE, children were learning about how Muslim's celebrate Ramadan and Eid. They learnt that fasting is an act of worship and used to develop empathy and gratitude, whilst teaching self-control. Children spent sometime reflecting on things that brought them joy whilst creating a mehndi design.

Computing

In Computing children have been learning how to make Sprites (characters) move on an animated background using Scratch Junior. This week they were project designing; designing their own space background and three rockets. Once they had designed their background and rockets, they decided how they wanted their rockets to move by creating a code/algorithm that they will input on Scratch to bring their animations to life.

We have introduced a new award for Friday's award assembly.

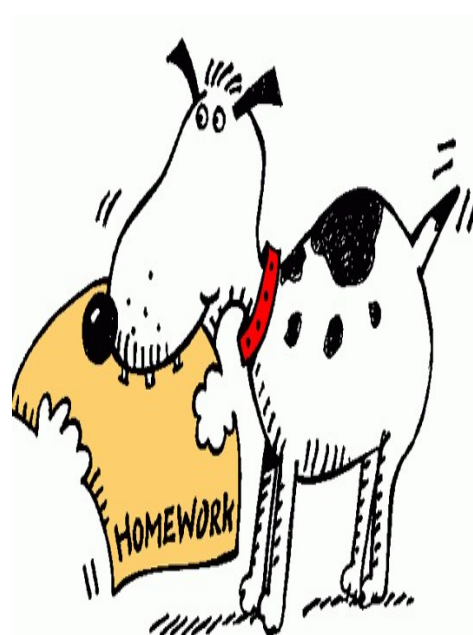
This is in recognition of the fabulous homework most of our children produce. It is also to show the importance of doing homework.

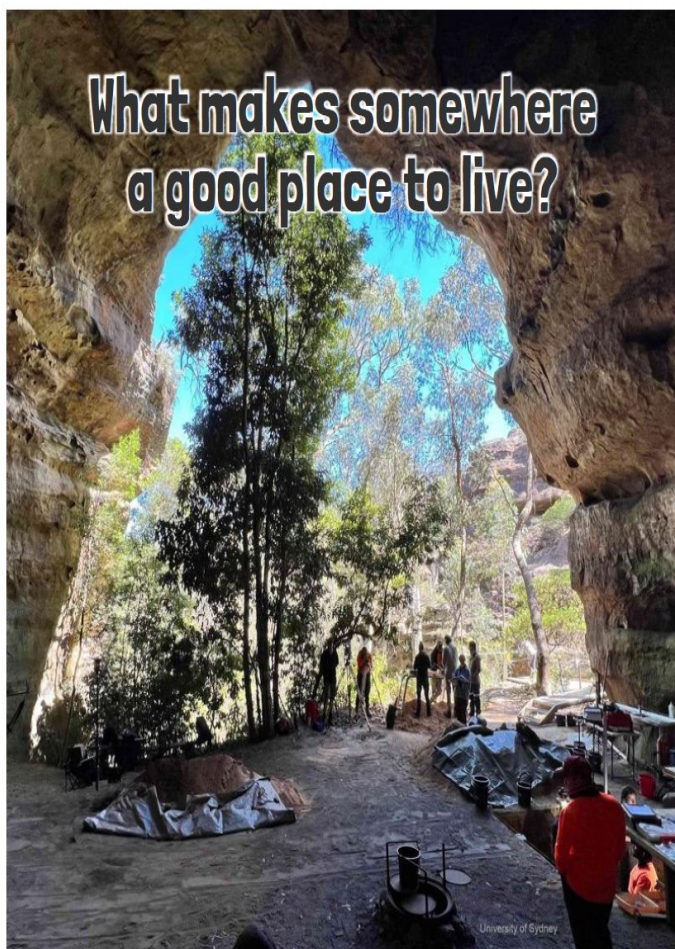

In the news this week

Scientists in Australia have discovered that human beings lived in high mountain caves nearly 20,000 years ago. They found tools, burnt wood, and other artefacts deep inside the caves of Australia's Blue Mountains, showing that people once cooked and lived there. The discovery is one of the earliest records of people living within this mountain range. The caves were likely a safe and useful place to shelter during cold winters in the mountains.

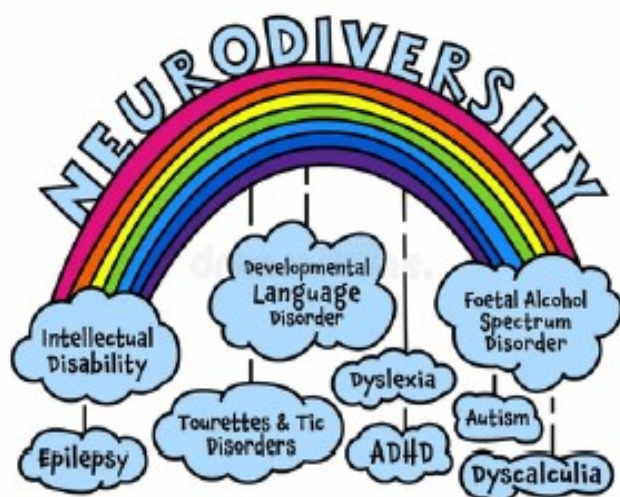
