# Family Cooking

On Wednesday 9th July, children from year 5 took part in a family cooking session as part of the Eat Well Project. Children worked alongside a parent to prepare and cook Egg Fried Rice. On Wednesday 10th July, 6 year 5 children were chosen to cook with their parent at Teagues Bridge Primary for a project with Eat Well. We came up with the decision of healthy, delicious egg fried rice. Here are the ingredients if you would like to make a healthy meal:

- Carrots
- Spring onion
- Red bell pepper
- Sweetcorn
- Peas
- Soy Sauce
- Egg
- A tiny bit of oil

Eat well - Workshops

We got to learn all about making healthy choices from the Telford Eat Well team last week. We looked at what we normally eat and what nutrients we were putting in our bodies. We saw how different foods fit into a balanced diet and how to portion different foods. We had a go with the NHS food scanner app and found out how much sugar was in some of our favourite snacks.



#### Science

We are learning about the digestive system and have looked at the organs involved. We will be doing a demonstration to act out how the food moves through the body and how our organs extract the nutrients we need to be strong and healthy.

### Literacy

We have been focusing on non-chronological reports and have had The Bacteria Book as our focus text. This week we have been writing our own report based on the book and have learned the best way to set out the information in a logical way. We are practising writing in paragraphs and using the features of a non-chronological report to make our writing easy to understand for the reader.



We have finished swimming for the year. Here are our PE slots for the rest of the year. This Friday first thing (come in PE kit with school uniform in bag) and Monday after break (bring PE kit to school) We <u>do not</u> have PE on the last day of school.



# This week in Swordfishm

### English

In English, we have learnt how to write non-chronological reports and biographies. We have practiced sorting information into sections related to the same topic. We have learnt facts about David Attenborough, Marie Curie and Stephen Hawkins so that we can write a biography about them next week.



### Eatwell Project

Last week, we had two Healthy Eating sessions. In the first one, we learnt about the 5 different food groups. We sorted different foods into these and then created our own Eatwell plate with the foods we had eaten the day before. In the second session, we learnt about sugar. We learnt how much sugar was in different foods—it was very interesting and eye-opening!



### Maths

In Maths, we have been exploring pictograms and line graphs. We have learnt about keys, scales and trends. Next week, we will be conducting our own survey and then recording our results using a line graph or pictogram.

### his week in Belugas.....

#### English

In English, we have been learning about persuasive texts. We began by organising information under the correct subheadings to help structure our writing clearly. Next, we looked at different persuasive texts, comparing them and identifying key features such as rhetorical questions, emotive language, and strong arguments. This has helped us prepare to write our own persuasive texts, focused on encouraging people to visit Crete.



#### Eatwell Project

Last week, we explored the topic of Healthy Eating through two engaging sessions. During the first session, we focused on understanding the five main food groups: fruits and vegetables, carbohydrates, proteins, dairy, and fats. We took part in an activity where we sorted a variety of foods into the correct groups, which helped us learn more about the role each one plays in keeping our bodies healthy. Afterwards, we thought about what we had eaten the day before and used that information to design our own Eatwell plates, making sure we included a balanced mix of food types. In our second session, the focus shifted to sugar. We were surprised to find out just how much sugar is hidden in some everyday foods and drinks. We looked at food packaging and labels to compare sugar content, and this really opened our eyes to the importance of making healthy choices. Overall, the sessions were fun, informative, and helped us understand how to make better decisions about the food we eat.



#### Swimming

Over the past two weeks, we had our final two swimming sessions. In the first session, we completed our swimming assessments, where everyone had the opportunity to swim various lengths and demonstrate the skills they've been practising. It was a great chance to see how much progress we've made. This week, we finished with a fun session to celebrate all our hard work. We played games in the water and enjoyed some free time—it was a fantastic way to end our swim ming lessons!





### his week in Octopi

This week in Octopi, we've been exploring how human activities affect ocean life and investigating meaningful ways we can help protect and preserve marine ecosystems. As part of our learning, we've conducted independent research and created our own mind map notes to organize our findings. Our research has covered topics such as pollution, overfishing, climate change, and habitat destruction, as well as solutions like reducing plastic use, supporting sustainable seafood, and participating in ocean clean-up efforts.

In our art lesson, we continued to explore the concepts of shape and pattern. This week, we had the opportunity to focus on a single shape and creatively adapt it into a geometric pattern. We really enjoyed this activity, as it allowed us to not only experiment with our own designs but also learn about different artists who specialise in geometric art. It was inspiring to see how simple shapes can be transformed into complex and visually striking patterns through repetition and variation.



This week was our final swimming lesson of the term. We really enjoyed it, as we had the chance to have fun using different floats and playing in the water. It was especially nice to swim with friends from other swimming groups, which we hadn't been able to do earlier in the term. It was a fun and relaxed way to end our swimming sessions! We also had time to reflect on the progress we've made, whether it was building our confidence in the water, improving our strokes, or learning new skills. Swimming this term has helped us grow stronger, more confident, and more comfortable in the water, and we're proud of howfar we've come.

# Information from Health Protection Hub

The Health Protection Hub at Telford & Wrekin Council have asked us send out some information to you on summer water safety. With the current hot weather, children, particularly older children, may look to go swimming in open water to cool down and have fun. This comes with various risks – cold water shock, currents, hidden underwater dangers and diseases such as Weil's disease. 46% of drownings occur in the summer months and this rises to 75% amongst 13 - 17-year olds. Educating children on these dangers is important in preventing tragic incidents.
