Dear Parents and Carers,

WELCOME:



Welcome back after the summer break. All the children seem to have settled well into the routines of their new classroom and new year groups. The new reception intake have had their first week full time and have managed really well. They are learning to follow instructions and are learning the school rules. They have settled into school life really well. Dates have been set for the Autumn term and these can be found at the end of the newsletter. All children are looking very smart in their school uniform. Please ensure they wear uniform at all times, no trainers and that everyone has a school PE kit. No necklaces or bracelets and no dangly earrings or hoops. Stud earrings only please.

If you have any concerns please ensure you speak to the class teacher in the first instance.

PD DAYS:

Each academic year PD days are set for teacher training. We have had to move one of our PD days from the 1st June 2026 to the 6th January 2026. This week in Turtles Class....




The children have had a fabulous start adapting to school life. We have spoke a lot about ourselves and our families and have started to understand and follow the school rules and routine.

In Literacy we have been looking at the story 'Stanleys Stick'. This taught us that we can use our imaginations in lots of different creative ways.






In maths we are exploring numicon through matching, counting and drawing.











This week in Starfish.

The story we have been reading in literacy is 'Stanley's Stick'. We have been labelling what we might find at the beach with reception children, writing the initial sounds of a word. With Year I children, we have been beginning to form sentences, thinking about capital letters, finger spaces and full stops.



We have been learning about seasons in science as we are in the process of changing seasons. We learnt about Autumn and discussed how we are seeing more leaves on the ground now.





In Maths we have been counting to IO as this is an essential skill. We have been counting objects that do not move, as well as objects we can touch and organise into groups. We have been using a ten frame to help us to organise our numbers and matching them to numerals.




This week in Seahorses

This week we began our new pathway into our Art project, where we are learning all about spirals! The children practiced moving their whole bodies to create spirals and created their










Maths

book and worked together as a team to create their own houses and invited each other to look around their creations.








This week in Dolphins.

In maths we have been learning all about our numbers to 100. We have been focusing on tens and ones and being able to use a part-whole model to represent the 2-digit number.





Our new literacy text is called 'Meerkat Mail'. We have been learning all about the Kalahari Desert in South Africa and discussing what is needed when writing a letter!

In our first two weeks we have been talking about the importance of differences and that everyone is welcome. We have been exploring this through Art and creating self-portraits of ourselves.



In the news this week

Schools in the UK will soon need to give more lessons on democracy, how voting works, and how the country is run. This is because the voting age for the general election is being lowered to 16. Many agree that young people need to be ready to make informed decisions. At first, these lessons will be for children aged 14 and over, but the plan is to begin teaching these issues from 11 years of age, so everyone has plenty of time to learn.

Things to talk about at home ...

- Talk to someone older at home, and ask them to share their experiences of voting and their thoughts on the news that 16-year-olds will be able to vote.
- Can you think of times when you have taken part in a vote? What was the outcome?
- Do you believe it's important for young people to learn about voting and democracy? If so, what age do you think the lessons should start?

Online Safety Newsletter Sept 2025

Coverstar

Coverstar say they are "the safe TikTok alternative." They state, "there is no specific age limitation...however, if you are under the age of 13, you must obtain parental consent." Users can post, comment and livestream.

Whilst Coverstar does not include private messaging, users can still interact via public comments. Coverstar does use moderation tools to scan all user-generated content. It is also important to be aware that Coverstardoes allow inapp purchases ranging from £0.99 -£59.99.

Online Safety Act

What is the Online Safety Act?

The Online Safety Act 2023 is a set of laws introduced to protect children and adults online. Ofcom is the regulator for online safety in the UK, responsible for ensuring companies follow the new rules. As part of this role. Ofcom have designed the Children Codes of practice, which came into force in July



2025. The codes outline what all online services likely to be accessed by children must do to protect children online, for example:

- Enforce age limits.
- Protect children from accessing harmful or age-inappropriate content. This includes content relating to self-harm and eating disorders.
- · Ensure users can easily report harmful content.

Ofcom has the power to enforce the rules as well as issue fines if companies fail to comply. You can find out more here:

How will it help to protect my child?

Artificial Intelligence (AI)

What is AI?

Al is when a computer/machine can learn and perform tasks like a human. Its popularity continues to grow, and examples include:

- Search engines such as Google now include an Algenerated overview as part of their results.
- Virtual assistants like Alexa, Meta Al and Siri.
- · Chatbots such as ChatGPT and My AI from Snapchat.

Opportunities

AI can be an effective tool when used correctly, for instance:

- Homework children can use AI to support and assist their learning.
- Advice AI can be used to provide information and suggestions on a variety of topics.

Risks and concerns

- Misinformation ensure your child understands that AI can sometimes provide incorrect or misleading information.
- Privacy issues read any privacy policies before using.
- Chat apps a simple search of "AI Chat" within the App store highlights the number of apps already available that are not suitable for children as many are rated as 17+.
- Image manipulation there are AI tools that can be used to digitally remove clothes from photos, which clearly raises serious safeguarding and privacy concerns.
- Deepfakes there are also AI tools that create realistic, fake videos that can be used to spread misinformation or cause harm.

How can I protect my child?

To help keep your child safe online, it is important to:

- Check age ratings of any apps or websites that your child accesses.
- Develop your child's digital literacy by highlighting the risks of AI and showing them how important it is to verify what they see online.
- Set up appropriate parental controls on their devices/ broadband.
- Chat to your child regularly and ensure your child knows that they should talk to you or another trusted adult if anything concerns them.

Roblox: Grow a Garden

Roblox is a platform consisting of a collection of games. Grow a Garden is one of the latest games available on Roblox and is extremely popular. The game is labelled as 'minimal' for content maturity, which Roblox define as "may contain occasional mild violence, light unrealistic blood, and/or occasional mild fear." Roblox believe that the game play is suitable for everyone. However, as the game is on Roblox, it is important to be aware of the following:

- Chat strangers can interact with your child.
- In-game purchases this game does include in-game purchases.
- Screentime set limits for how long your child is playing.

A lot of the content on Roblox is user generated, which may mean not all games will be suitable for your child to view/play. If your child is playing Roblox, it is important to monitor what your child is accessing, ensure they know how to use any reporting tools and set up appropriate parental controls.


