

JEWELLERY

Safer Internet Day 2026

Safer Internet Day returned on Tuesday 10th February 2026, and this year's theme, "Together for a Better Digital Future," is a reminder that online safety isn't just a school topic – it's a family one too. Children are growing up in a world where digital life and real life blend seamlessly, and they need adults who can guide them with confidence, curiosity, and calm.

Why Safer Internet Day Matters

Children are exploring online spaces earlier than ever, and the risks they face are evolving just as quickly. From AI-generated content to new social platforms, the digital world is full of opportunities – but also challenges. Safer Internet Day gives families a moment to pause, reflect, and reset healthy online habits.

Three Things Parents Can Do This Month....

1. Start a conversation, not a lecture

Ask open questions like "What apps are your friends using lately?" or "What's something online that made you feel good this week?" You'll learn far more from curiosity than from warnings alone.



2. Review privacy and safety settings together

Sit down with your child and check the basics: who can contact them, what they're sharing, and how to report or block. Doing this with them builds skills they'll use for years.

3. Model the digital behaviour you want to see

Children watch how adults use technology. Demonstrating healthy habits, like taking breaks, being kind online, and thinking before posting, has more impact than any rule.

What a fantastic half term we have had together. After the break, we have PE after break on Mondays and PE after lunch on Fridays.



We have really enjoyed our art topic this half term, learning about Monotypes.









This week in Octopi...

We have been working extra hard in Octopi for our final week before the half term holiday. In Maths, we have been learning about negative numbers, including adding, subtracting and comparing.

In Literacy, we have completed our studies on *Ronan and the Mermaid* by writing our own versions of the story, and some of us made little tweaks to the ending in order to give it a personal twist.




This week in Sharks


Over the last two weeks, in Sharks, we have been working hard through out all the curriculum areas.


We then took what we learnt and created safer internet posters. Here are some of our examples.

We have introduced a new award for Friday's award assembly.


This is in recognition of the fabulous homework most of our children produce. It is also to show the importance of doing homework.


